RESOLUTION NO. 11-029

A RESOLUTION INSTRUCTING THE MAYOR TO REQUEST AN AMENDED CAPITAL COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT FROM THE NEW MEXICO DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION WHICH WILL CHANGE THE PROJECT SCOPE AND DIRECT \$51,000 OF SEVERANCE TAX BOND PROCEEDS TO ONE OR MORE RESIDENTIAL ROAD PROJECTS DESCRIBED IN THE 2011/2012 LOCAL GOVERNMENT ROAD CO-OP PROGRAM LIST

Whereas, the Village of Corrales received capital outlays in 2008 to complete the construction of Loma Larga Road, \$457,000 of which remained after the project was completed; and

Whereas, the funds were reauthorized in 2009 in Appropriation 09-3587 for the purpose of “plan, design and construct road and drainage improvements and to purchase land for roads in Corrales” as part of Severance Tax Bond legislation; and

Whereas, most of the reauthorized funds were rescinded and reverted in 2010 by the SB 182 signed by the Governor, though \$51,000 was not reverted; and

Whereas, the Governing Body by Resolution 09-048, August 25, 2009, instructed the Mayor and Administration to proceed to construct bike lanes and a compacted earth trail from Loma Larga along West Meadowlark Lane to the boundary with the City of Rio Rancho; and

Whereas, the Mid-Region Metropolitan Planning Organization approved in October, 2009 the “design and construct of a bicycle trail 5’ wide on both sides of Meadowlark Lane” as one of the Surface Transportation Project – Enhancement (STP-E) projects in its Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for completion in federal Fiscal Year 2010 using \$160,500 of federal and \$53,500 of local funds; and

Whereas, at the Village’s request, due to the loss of State capital outlays identified (in Resolution 09-048) for use as the local match, the planned bicycle trail was moved administratively by the MPO staff from federal FY 2010 to federal FY 2011; and

Whereas, by motion at its October 12, 2010 meeting, the Governing Body directed the Mayor to use the \$51,000 remaining from Appropriation 09-3587, to fund the local match for the bicycle trail on West Meadowlark Lane; and

Whereas, as required, an amendment was executed November 9, 2010 to the Capital Cooperative Agreement of August 19, 2008 with the New Mexico Department of Transportation, with a term until June 30, 2012, with the project scope described as “design and construct 1.6 miles of bicycle trail 5’ wide on both sides of West Meadowlark Lane from Village line to Loma Larga Road”; and

Whereas, a pre-design meeting for the federal- and State-funded bicycle trail project was held with the West Meadowlark Lane neighborhood March 23, 2011 with residents voicing several concerns about the planned bike trail project; and

Whereas, at its April 12, 2011 meeting, the Governing Body, by majority vote, instructed the Mayor “to cease the current effort to design and construct trails and bike lanes along upper Meadowlark”; and

Whereas, the Governing Body adopted February 22, 2011, Resolution No. 11-009 approving the participation of the Village of Corrales in the 2011/2012 Local Government Road Co-Op Program of the New Mexico Department of Transportation with an attached list of needed residential road improvements; and

Whereas, such residential road improvements meet the “plan design and construct road and drainage improvements” legislative purpose of Appropriation 09-3587; and

Whereas, the Village could enter into an amended Capital Cooperative Agreement with NMDOT with an altered project scope to specify that the \$51,000 in funds available could be used effectively to address residential road projects described on the Co-Op list,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE VILLAGE OF CORRALES, NEW MEXICO THAT:

The Mayor submit to the New Mexico Department of Transportation a request that the project scope of the amended Capital Cooperative Agreement of November 9, 2010 be revised to say that the \$51,000 balance will be used for one or more residential road projects identified in the 2011/2012 Local Government Road Co-Op Program approval.
